

## FHSU announces new provost

Dr. Jill Arensdorf, current chair of the Department of Leadership Studies, has been named as FHSU's next provost and vice president for academic affairs.



"Dr. Arensdorf brings more than 17 years of higher education experience to the position with a candid knowledge of our university," said President Tisa Mason.

"Most importantly, she thoroughly understands the complex and distinctively innovative nature of Fort Hays State," said the president. "The leadership studies program she currently leads serves as an example of our approach to delivering high-quality programs in all three of our principal modalities – on campus, online and cross border."

President Mason said that the university's success depends on finding new ways to recruit, retain and successfully graduate an increasingly diverse global population of students.

"Fort Hays State University is a phenomenal university that has given me and so many others opportunities to learn and grow," said Arensdorf.

Arensdorf's research interests include youth leadership development, service-learning, civic engagement, program assessment and leadership behaviors. She has published extensively on the effects of service-learning on youth leadership skills.

# FHSU, BCC pilot enhanced transfer program to provide more help, earlier

Fort Hays State University has partnered with Barton Community College to launch a pilot for a new kind of two-year-to-four-year school transfer program.

Transfer Connect is an innovative modification to the current articulation process that provides more help and guidance earlier in the process.

"Transfer Connect differs from the standard articulation – two-plus-two – agreement in that a Transfer Success Coach fosters a partnership with students and their community college advisors before the students are admitted to FHSU," said Erica Fisher, articulation coordinator and recruiter at FHSU.

Prospective transfer students can work directly with a success coach at FHSU while they are completing their associate degrees. For the pilot program, FHSU is only accepting transfers from Barton Community College, but the hope is that eventually the program can be expanded across Kansas, said Fisher.

Other services are also provided while the student is completing the associate degree. These services include developing a plan of study, making course recommendations, providing up-to-date



information on deadlines (admission, scholarships, financial aid, housing, and others), engaging in semester check-ins, and setting educational goals.

#### FHSU, Leo Burnett design for success

#### Olliff named Counselor of the Year

He is a founder of the Olliff Family Educational Symposium on mental health among students from kindergarten through college. It is an annual event at Fort Hays State University, sponsored by the College of Education.

During his professional career, Olliff has performed personal, drug and alcohol wellness and substance abuse counseling as well as worked with students in groups and as individuals.
