2.2. About the Instructor:

Currently pursuing EDD in Instructional Design and Performance Technology. 16 years of K-12 teaching experience in the state of Kansas. 6 years of full time Higher Education teaching experience at FHSU. Creative work and Research: Mixed Drawing and Printmaking media involving alternative print methods, kinetic and interactive sculpture investigation, and traditional drawing methods. Conceptual research: The human expression and reaction to shock, vulnerability, real or imagined threat, and cortisol flooded experiences. Pedagogical research: Impacts on creative adult learning processes as influenced by asynchronous instructional delivery and the learning disability ADHD.



3. TEXTBOOK AND COURSE MATERIALS

3.1. Required Materials: There is not a required textbook for this class as all curriculum materials are delivered within each unit in Blackboard. You will need to ensure that you have a good studio space to work in where you have adequate lighting, a surface with some sort of cutting mat (this can be tagboard, cardboard, or any other protective surface, and the ability to draw, paint, and sculpt. You all are welcome to use the FHSU facilities if you live in Hays. You will have to find time outside of regularly scheduled class times in the labs for this. CAD 225 on the second floor is well equipped for this course if you wish to use the space. You will not have the ability to store your work in there as in-person class students occupy all storage areas.

3.2. Technology Requirement:

All students enrolled at Fort Hays State University are expected to have a computer* for use in a variety of university learning experiences. ****On-campus students are expected to have a laptop to ensure mobility.***

6. TEACHING, LEARNING METHODS, & COURSE STRUCTURE

- 6.1. Delivery Method: Lecture, demonstration, personal interaction and counsel, Apprentice modeling, formative and summative critical analysis.
- 6.2. Instructional Approach: Universal Design for Learning practice in the instruction of adult learners is the comprehensive approach I incorporate in my teaching.
- 6.3. Course Structure: As an online asynchronous course, it is vital for your success to regularly (more than weekly) visit the Blackboard course shells, Yellowdig posts, and to be active in posting and replying to peer posts. For your benefit, I host weekly office hours for this course on Thursdays from 5-6 PM. You can attend through the Inspace application (find this in course resources). These meetings are not mandatory but are helpful in keeping students regularly engaged. I outline the weekly work, provide helpful mentoring for project work, and answer student questions during this time.

10. COURSE POLICIES AND ASSIGNMENT DETAILS

- 10.1. Class Attendance: Mandatory and graded.
- 10.2. Class Participation: Mandatory and graded.
- 10.3. Assignment Due Dates and submission procedures: Please note that all submission deadlines (except for midterm and final work) fall on Sunday evenings before midnight each week. There are two locations you must submit or post work: Yellowdig and Blackboard. The assignments for each week are listed in the course schedule. Be sure you check where you are to post or submit that assignment as stated in the course schedule. My advice is to make your weekly posts and submissions before the Sunday midnight deadline to avoid late penalties.
- 10.4. Sketchbook/Process Journal: In addition to submitting the final state of your project, you must provide a Process Journal that illustrates your creative thinking and idea formation. See the examples provided within each unit for format and presentation ideas. My advice to you; keep everything you made or sketched out during project process. This will enable you to provide a comprehensive visual narrative about your creative journey.
- 10.5. Yellowdig posts: You are required to make 2 posts each week (see course schedule) to maintain adequate attendance and productivity in the course. Each post is worth 10 points and they must be made on time. I do not accept late submissions in these posts. Please ensure you post to the correct topic for the week!!! They are numbered by week. Take a picture each day of the work you have made. You are welcome to take several and post as many as you like.



- 10.6. Project Self-Assessment: There are 5 projects in this course that you will create. At the completion of each project, you will make a Yellowdig post showing the outcome, write a bit and/or make a short video reflecting on the outcome, and finally perform a self-assessment that you will submit in Blackboard. Also, note that you are responsible for peer review of work on each project as well. This is like an in class critique but performed through Yellowdig. Look over all of your classmates' work and provide evaluative feedback. The self-assessment assignment sheet is posted within each assignment in blackboard. Most students fill these out in class right after critique.
- 10.7. Extensions/Late Work: The process to request an extension is the student's responsibility. The request must be made before the deadline day. The work must be in progress (meaning I will not grant an extension for work that has not been started). The requesting student will only be granted an extension if their attendance and productivity scores are above 80%. Late work is not accepted unless an extension has been agreed upon. The extended deadline is enforced strictly.
- 10.8. Absences: In alignment with university policy, I require students to attend every single class meeting. If you are ill and contagious (or required to quarantine), you need to contact student affairs and email me as soon as possible to report your absence. I will allow students who follow this policy to make up attendance and productivity points for the week so long as they complete all the required work on time for that week. These points are earned by posting evidence of your work in Yellowdig. Your physical presence is important in studio courses, so make every honest effort to make it to class. If you feel you are coming down with an illness, I encourage you to wear a mask to limit transmission to others.
- 10.9. Clean up: You are required to leave the studio as clean or cleaner than you found it. Put all furniture (such as desks, easels, stools, cutting mats) away after you are finished using it. Always wipe down the desks with sanitizing wipes when you are finished using them. Replace all class media materials to the correct location. Use the classroom studio as much as possible!
- 10.10. Collaboration Procedures: Students are expected to seek formative critique on a continual basis from class peers. Mutually respectful behavior is expected in these interactions. Peer interaction in this course is expected and your work will benefit greatly from seeking creative feedback. Further, when working with each other, the quality of critique should be honest, productive, and reciprocal. Yellowdig interactions are excellent for this purpose, so be involved!
- 10.11. Yellowdig creative assistance: Use the #creativequestionhub topic to post questions about assignments or projects, creative solutions you have found, helpful links, and so on. This is a place to get questions answered, collaborate



with peers, and for anything art related that may be of interest to classmates. I enter that topic space weekly to assist you all with anything you might need.
