Intensive study in the oil medium.

Course Description

In this course, students will expand their study in color and composition through representational and semi-abstract subjects. Assignments will focus on building aesthetical sensibilities in color while exploring various expressive possibilities. The course will use acrylic, oil, and other drawing and painting medium and mixed media. The class will introduce how to build canvases and various surfaces.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Expand knowledge of color theory and its application.
- 2. Enhance aesthetic judgment and sensibilities in color usage
- 3. Develop the ability to convey themes, emotions, and narratives through color in both representational and abstract works
- 4. Explore advanced approaches to composition through the study of light, space, and color.
- 5. Gain technical skills in constructing various surface of painting/drawing
- 6. Experiment with different materials and application in painting/drawing
- 7. Study related art historical periods and contemporary artists.
- 8. Understand contemporary painting concepts and processes.
