

Our newly designed centralized student programming board works collaboratively with others to provide social and educational experiences for students. Our growing Fraternity and Sorority Life community encompasses 8 chapters representing about 150 students. Our team is working to nurture a new generation of engaged, dedicated, and thoughtful citizen leaders.

### TUTORING FALL 2023 & SPRING 2024

210 students utilized the drop-in tutoring partnership between our office and the Math Department offered Sunday-Thursday from 5-10 PM in the CSS.

112% increase in tutoring appointments since tutoring moved to the Fischli-Wills Center for Student Success.

#### 12 STUDENT AFFAIRS

As we complete another fast and furious year, the Enrollment Leadership Cluster (ELC) reflects on its impact in collaboration with others. Throughout this year, our efforts have helped keep the mission of FHSU and student recruitment and management at the forefront of our actions.

### A highlight of each ELC department's progress in project completion:

- The Admissions office collaborated with departments across campus to develop new Admission Packets for incoming students.
- FHSU Online launched an Online Open House recruiting plan.
- Financial Aid made FHSU the first university to launch and fully use the Workday Financial Aid Module while dealing with the new FASFA crisis.
- Early College Programs launched a Parent Booster Club and made significant changes to the program's culture of living.
- Office of the Registrar promoted and is working with other divisions to pilot early matriculation.
- Retention and Persistence has taken the lead on the implementation of Navigate after helping to lead the successful implementation of the Parent Portal for new and continuing students.
- Shooting Sports welcomed a new facility and the second head coach in program history, Jerrod Lies. Program creator and founding head coach Duane Shepard began a well-earned retirement.
